Sep 10.* Keep It Simple, Keep It Real. Rev. Doak's discourse will consider what we're about as a religious/spiritual community. What does our franchise (Unitarian Universalism) signify? His reflections will offer thoughts on legacy and some imagining of what we can be, maybe what we should be, and how we get there. We'll also celebrate our annual water communion ritual. Remember to bring a small container of water you've collected during your summer activities (or water to represent/symbolize your activities). Led by Rev. Doak Mansfield.

Sep 17. President's Service. We advocate for peace, justice, equality, and solutions to environmental problems. But is humanity making progress or falling behind? We'll recap recent events that impact UU goals, and we'll take a longer view of some positive trends seldom mentioned in the daily news. Led by Stu Feldstein.

Sep 24. We All Live Downstream. Rev. Doak will share some thoughts on how our personal heritage informs our lives. On the eve of Yom Kippur, he'll look at the religious legacies that combine to make up the very mixed religious background of our culture (Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Buddhism, Humanism, etc.). What meanings are there for us today? Led by Rev. Doak Mansfield.

Ministry is a unique calling/profession that is grounded in mutual respect and appreciation. It's concerned with consideration of meanings that enlighten, bless, and guide, and the enabling of caring for others and our shared life. It involves a review of the human story—learnings, failures, options, and possibilities. It's dealing with big and little questions of being and becoming. What is good and how does one live it? I'm so happy we'll be involved in such an enterprise.

Below is our RE calendar for September.

Sep 10. First Day of RE. Every week, we'll begin our morning upstairs to help light the sanctuary chalice and recite our opening words, and then head downstairs to the RE gathering space. Once downstairs, we'll light our own mini-chalice, share joys and concerns, and begin establishing a routine for our RE sessions. Most importantly, we'll take some time to get to know each other.

Sep 17. Introduction of Moral Tales. During our second session, we'll "fish" for friends as a fun way of welcoming each other. Then, we'll play a game introducing/reviewing the tales we shared last year and the moral lesson we learned from each. We'll also set expectations of the RE program and begin to form a covenant of behavior.

Sep 24. Welcome One and All. In this third session, children are introduced to the moral lesson Welcome One and All. We'll hear a story that reminds us not to judge a book by its cover and to always include everyone. If time permits, we'll do an interactive activity to make this bit of wisdom more concrete.
